“We are playing for a mighty stake. The game must be played boldly. . . . We are organizing. We will be compelled to shoot, burn and hang, but the thing will soon be over. We intend to Mormonize the Abolitionists. If we win we can carry slavery to the Pacific ocean. There are eleven hundred men coming over from Platte County to vote . . . and if that ain’t enough we can send five thousand—enough to kill every goddamned abolitionist in the Territory.”

 - a) Briefly explain the historical event reflected by Seward’s and Atchison’s statements.
 - b) Provide ONE specific historical episode which contributed to circumstances causing Seward’s and Atchison’s remarks.
 - c) Provide ONE specific historical episode which resulted from conditions expressed in the excerpts.
